Per Walmart to Complainant:" These treats were stopped at Port and then released by Customs" and she purchased these treats 7/19/07. Complainant's dog went into renal failure and was euthanized 7/27/07.</p> <p>Product was purchased 7/18/07. Dogs became ill within 24 hrs with symptoms of vomiting and loss of kidney function. Complainant says she has contacted Walmart who has done a voluntary pull off the shelves of this product because they have several other complaints.</p> <p>Update 8/2/07. 1st dog was 7 yrs old female Soft-coated Wheaten terrier with weight of 39 lbs and by the time she was euthanized was 30 pounds. July 3rd 07, dog was spayed and was doing fine. Dog came home on same day. Dog was fed Solid Gold Lamb and Rice hard dog food - 1 1/2 cups daily. Dog had been eating that food for seven years. No canned soft food given. Dog was first given Bestro's jerky strips on July 19th, 2007. Dog was given 2 treats daily for approximately and on July 23rd last treat was given. Complainant woke up next morning to dog being sick with extremely large puddle of liquid - clear colored. Dog was taken to vet after 2nd large clear puddle and large amounts of vomit discovered. Vet was seen at 7:00 a.m. Vet did urinalysis and vet said urine was next closest thing to water and vet believed blood work needed to be performed. Vet suspected kidney problems. Blood work revealed elevated Creatinine and BUN levels were elevated. Vet kept dog. I.V. fluids given and antibiotics. Complainant took dog home to assist with care and took dog back next day to vet and Creatinine was elevated two points higher. Vet kept dog again and changed antibiotic. Dog had fluids and creatinine level increased to 7.3 On friday morning, dog was euthanized and creatinine level was 9.3.</p> <p>Second dog is 2 yr old female Soft-coated Wheaten Terrier with no pre-existing conditions. She stated, she started feeding her dog Waggin' Train Brand Chicken Jerky Tenders (40oz resealable plastic pouch) approximately a year ago as a treat after each walk. She stated she walks her dog three times a day (1st dog walk: 6:00am to 7:00am, 2nd walk 12:30pm to 1:30pm and 3rd walk 4:30pm to 5:30pm) and after each walk she gives him a treat (as reward) for passing stool. She stated she first gave her dog the chicken jerky treat first and then she gave him his breakfast which is the Milkbone Beef Steak Dog Treat, Purina Tbonz and Milkbone Maro-Snack. For his lunch only the chicken jerky treat after his walk and for dinner after his walk the chicken jerky treat and one package of Little Cesar pet food. She stated after six months of giving her dog the Waggin' Train Brand Chicken Jerky Tenders, she noticed a change in his stool but thought nothing of it until the last three months she observed that her dog stool became runny/pudding like, diarrhea and vomiting in the early morning (between the hours of 3:00am to 4:00am) which became frequent. b6 &amp; b7c stated she observed her dog display the behavior of not wanting to eat his dinner when given to him. She stated that she is taking her dog to see the Veterinary (b6 &amp; b7c) on Friday, 8/24/07 with concerns of his illness and she is also taking a sample of her dog's stool to the Veterinary. Note: She stated that her mother purchased the same product identified as (Waggin'Train Chicken Jerky Tenders - Lot#94621, Best use by date: 11/07/08) and her mother's dog (5.5 year old Dachshund) did not display any signs of illness.</p>	<p>She stated her dog stool became runny/pudding like, diarrhea and vomiting in the early morning (3:00am - 4:00am) which became frequent. He became lethargic and was hospitalized at b6 &amp; b7c from July 14-21, 2007. I spoke with b4, b6 &amp; b7c, DVM who stated that b6 &amp; b7c had both Liver and pancreas failure but didn't seem to have kidney failure. On July 30th, b6 &amp; b7c the other dog, a 6 month old dachschund/chihuahua mix was taken to the vet because he had lost his appetite and was lethargic. The owner initially thought b6 &amp; b7c just missed b6 &amp; b7c, but realized that b6 &amp; b7c was very sick. b6 &amp; b7c presented at the Veterinary Clinic with a BUN of 225 and creatinine of 3.9. He was diagnosed with kidney failure and was hospitalized for a week. He did show some improvement, but is rapidly declining again. The owner stated that he would have to have b6 &amp; b7c euthanized and when I spoke to b6 &amp; b7c she did confirm that she believes b6 &amp; b7c will not survive this ordeal. She also stated that it is very suspicious to her that two young dogs became ill with life threatening diseases, even though the first one did not present with kidney failure, she does not discount its illness was food related. The consumer was at work and is calling me back tomorrow morning with the lot code and manufacturing information from the WalMart treats.</p> <p>On 8/23/08 I spoke with b6 &amp; b7c and he provided the information from the package. After the dogs would become ill they would be put on a bland diet (Canine ID) until they were better. Once the dogs were given the tenders again they would experience bloody diarrhea again a day or so later. They have gone through 7-8 different bags of this product over the past year. The dogs are 3-4 years old and approx 40lbs each. One is a Sheltie/Shepherd mix and the other is a mixed breed-unsure what mix. The dogs would consume one piece of jerky each as a treat occasionally (not daily). The complainants contacted their vet by phone but was told if the dogs were still eating, drinking and not lethargic then they should be fed Canine ID and they did not need to bring them in for exam.</p> <p>Added 1/7/08 by C. McNab: Waggin Train LLC, aka Alan Lee Distributors, aka ADI Pet, Inc in Corona, CA (FEI 3004328857) is the warehouse storage location and distributor for Waggin Train brand Jerky Treats. LOS-DO conducted an EI and sample collection on 8/17/07. Sample #429446 was negative for melamine and salmonella. Second sample (432898) screened for a battery of pathogens; all were negative. Both samples were from product lot 94692. Manufacturing site info obtained from Corp HQ - Waggin Train LLC, 1924 Pearman Dairy Road, Suite B, Anderson, SC (FEI 3006569081). He was put on a bland diet and antibiotics, however b6 &amp; b7c kept feeding b6 &amp; b7c the chicken jerky strips. Today b6 &amp; b7c is concerned about jerky food products manufactured in China that are still sold by Costco for pets. Apparently Costco, in the US and Canada, no longer sells Wagon Train or Benni Tenni jerky products for pets (both manufactured in China), but now Costco is selling a new brand of jerky for pets, Kindom Chicken Jerky, that is distributed by Los Angeles, CA, but manufactured in China b6 &amp; b7c wants the jerky either pulled off the shelf or have Costco add a sign that the product is made in China (even though "made in China" is already clearly labeled on the products). I explained to b6 &amp; b7c that the FDA has put plant protein products from China on import alert but cannot put all food products from China on import alert without evidence of adulteration or tampering. The plan of treatment was to flush fluids though the kidneys and see if he could revive them. This continued through the weekend and he called me over the weekend to let me know the "numbers" were somewhat improving on the kidneys, but still unacceptable and he needed to keep her for a few more days. On Monday morning, 01/30/2012, he called and told me that her kidneys were shutting down and she was slowly and painfully dieing. He suggested my wife and I get to his office as soon as possible to see her before she died. We did go and observed her painfully trying to stand up for us but being too weak to do so.
